Public Transit-Embrace the Suck!

I have not had an "edgy" Soapbox for a while, so I figured it was time to take some shots at society, government, tax spending, in general, and public transit in particular.

You either believe that carbon engines are the devil by now or you don't. I am not going to try to convince you one way or another. Clearly, battle lines are drawn, and one side wants nothing short of complete destruction and elimination of the gas and oil industry. Whether we (citizens) are ready or not.

- 1. Already we have seen new gas stations outlawed in virtually every city in Marin and Sonoma Counties.
- 2. We are also seeing the EPA approving the outlawing of diesel big rig trucks by 2035 (California's plan to phase out diesel trucks has been approved by the EPA: NPR).
- We are also seeing the outlawing of any diesel trucks with a motor older than 2010 in CA (<u>California is blocking diesel big rigs with pre-2010 engines (greencarreports.com)</u>
- 4. Now we are seeing "vehicle miles travelled" being the major factor in whether a road project will break ground or not.
- All of these things are important, but I am really focusing on public transit.
- 6. Public transit is a key factor in climate change activist tools to lower GHG emissions. Compared to a car with only a driver, subways produce 76% less in greenhouse gas emissions per passenger mile, light rail systems 62% less, and buses 33% less, according to the U.S. Transportation Department.

Obviously, the numbers listed above have certain assumptions-like there is at least one rider on the subway or bus or train. I wish I could give you more information on those assumptions, but the information is too damn hard to acquire. Needless to say, public transit is less harmful to GHG emissions if, and only if, a certain number of folks use the public transit.

Statewide, monthly public transit ridership dropped from 100 million in February 2019 to about 20 million in June 2020. As of June 2022, the numbers rebounded to about 60 million, but varied by region and transportation mode.



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The fares that riders pay not only help keep buses and trains running, but help agencies qualify for state and federal grants. Transit agencies say that the federal funding they've received during the pandemic will run out within two years. Looking ahead, state regulations that phase out vehicles that use gasoline and diesel fuel will also reduce the tax revenue paid to transit agencies, putting more stress on their finances.

Bottom line-dollars are being diverted from the infrastructure bill (\$1.2 trillion), as well as from state gas tax funded projects as well as federal excise gas tax projects to help public transit agencies stay solvent. Federal bailout saves Bay Area public transit - Curbed SF

My question is obviously just for musing-is there any "cap" to what government demands we pay to subsidize and support public transit?

The answer is

NO.

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
