The Hard Work of Access Between Public Officials and the ECA

Speaking with one voice that represents the general engineering industry in the North Bay Area, is one of the benefits of belonging to the ECA. Since 1976, we have tried to be the one voice expressing concerns regarding fair business practices, fostering access and good relationships between contractors, suppliers and public officials, and influencing policies that benefit the public and the ECA membership. We should be proud of what we have accomplished over the years, and this is one soapbox that is written to reflect that pride. Thanks for taking the time to read it-----

On March 25, 2024, the City of Santa Rosa met with some representatives from the ECA to discuss ways to improve the bidding and construction process on public projects. The meeting was respectful, collaborative, and direct. I have to hand it to the city staff as their intent was "how can we make it better?" as their attitude coming in and during the meeting. Our ECA representatives did a nice job of providing some ways to make the projects get out to bid quicker and get built better so we can get paid quicker.

I think it is important for the ECA members to understand the benefit of "access" when working with the City of Santa Rosa and other municipalities. Being able to have opportunities to share ideas in a constructive way is one of the biggest reasons to belong to this great association. In an effort to help other ECA members understand what that process is like, and how it can positively impact our industry locally, I have shared some of the questions and comments that came out of our meeting with all of you.

I hope this list of comments and questions reflect some of your own thoughts on how we might make bidding and constructing projects better! When we get the responses back from the city, I will share their comments with all of you and ECA members will certainly have an "access" edge that is a result of being a member with the ECA. I appreciate all of the participation from those that helped form and express the questions and comments and am certain the city staff did as well.

- A. One idea the ECA firms had was the City of SR try and transition to bidding projects in September, October, November, and December for the next year's construction calendar. Our guys like this idea a lot and even if the project is bid in October and not able to get NTP until May or June the next year, there is great value to our ECA firms.
- B. Shortening the timeline from project bid opening to NTP is a concern to ECA firms. We heard from the 3-25-24 meeting that GC's have led to the long timeline because they submitted bonds and insurance incorrectly. Perhaps those forms, with the proper language, can be (I am surprised if they are not already) included in the bidding docs? When I was contracting, it was our practice to send the pertinent docs for insurance to our insurance broker so during the prebid time, we knew what we and our subs/suppliers had to comply with, and we could accommodate that in our bidding cost to you. Other than including the docs, I am not sure what else could be considered to shorten the timeline from Bid to NTP, but we would like to see if the city could shorten that timeline if possible.
- C. Another idea to item "B" above, could the City issue the requirements for those forms to their website for prospective bidders? Also, could a "timeline" be standardized on the city website so there is a checklist for most items needed from the Contractor and the timeline needed for review and acceptance by the city? We are thinking by just doing the timeline/checklist, some ideas may occur to the city how we might shorten that time from Bid to NTP. Further dialog between us may be necessary and we are available for that. This suggestion is not to "pin down the city" so we have a bid protest or a change order request. It is simply a tool to help our ECA firms figure out their bid costs more accurately.
- D. Will the City of SR entertain an "exit survey" meeting with the owner, GC, CM all present to discuss what went well and what did not go well with the completed project? I really liked this suggestion, and it seems like it is an inexpensive way to get good and nearly immediate feedback that would be useful. Our ECA folks do not think it would add anything to the cost of the project, but rather, would save dollars on future projects.
- E. There was general discussion that the City hires 3rd party CM's that demonstrate their "worth" by being "nitpicky" regarding inspections, quantity of measured work in place, and acknowledgement of changed conditions warranting a change order be issued. Those are not my words, but what I heard. If this exists, we feel it sometimes could lead to longer periods of closeout of the contract, longer times to approve progress payments, and longer times to issue and approve change order work. Will the City of SR take steps to ensure 3rd party CMs are incentivized to get the project completed with the specified quality of work installed and closed out in the fastest manner possible? Could a "mini partnering" attitude/process possibly improve this perceived issue?

There were some other questions around the subject of the new Project Labor Agreement enacted by the City of Santa Rosa, and I will share those questions and comments in a future newsletter if the interest is there. Please let me know if you think we are "on the right track" with these efforts to make our projects go better, get more of them to the street to bid faster, and get us paid quicker and completely!

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




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

Workplace Violence Program

Implementation "Target Date" - July 1, 2024

Senate Bill 553 requires employers to create, implement and maintain a Workplace Violence Program by July 1, 2024. Employers must also train their entire workforce.

The Workplace Violence Program must include a reporting mechanism (how is the employee going to report incidents), detailing who will be responsible for receiving complaints, and who will be responsible for identifying and mitigating workplace hazards.

Jim Persons has developed a Workplace Violence Program and Active Shooter Guidelines that meet the requirements of this new regulation. He can also provide training resources for your employees.

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CALIFORNIA'S NEW WORKPLACE VIOLENCE PREVENTION REQUIREMENTS

No later than July 1, 2024, covered California employers must implement extensive workplace violence prevention plans (WVPP) and deliver specified training to employees under new legislation signed by Governor Gavin Newsom on September 30, 2023. In order to comply on time – including preparing plans that are "specific to the hazards and corrective measures <u>for each work area</u>" as required – employers will need to prepare early.

Senate Bill 533 adds section 6401.9 to the California Labor Code. The legislation is intended to help employers prevent and respond effectively to workplace violence.

Covered employers must deliver the training to all employees no later than July 1, 2024, and annually thereafter.
