Remember-this is an op-ed piece and I do not speak for the ECA or any of its members in this "Soapbox". These are just my ramblings that hopefully you find thought provoking.

### **Cynicism and Hope**

Brightline West has broken ground on the long discussed high speed rail system linking Los Angeles to Las Vegas. Armed with some \$3 billion from the \$1.2 Trillion Infrastructure bill for "seed money" and adding to that some \$3.5 billion in private funding (primarily in bond sales), the proposed \$12 billion project (arguably) has 50% of the needed funding to complete the project. This, of course, assumes the estimates are accurate and will hold the final cost at some \$12 billion (BRIGHTLINE WEST BREAKS GROUND ON AMERICA'S FIRST HIGH-SPEED RAIL PROJECT CONNECTING LAS VEGAS TO SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA | Brightline).

So how solid is the financial backing of \$3.5 billion in bond sales plus \$3 billion from the infrastructure act when the cost is twice that total (estimates are \$12 billion)?

In my humble opinion, the financing is not secure at all!

Where will the other \$11.5 billion come from? Tickets are now on sale for 2028 to go from Rancho Cucamonga to Las Vegas should you want to prepurchase tickets 4 years (at least!!) in advance. It might pay to prepurchase those if they guarantee the price right now as the prospectus discussed a ticket price of \$80 but is not being discussed as \$200.

Seems like a sketchy financing plan to me.

How much is the owner Brightline actually putting up with their own money?

I have spent hours researching this and cannot find out much of anything.

Brightline has a pretty "sketch" track record of building high speed rail to begin with. They did build a small rail system in Florida, and they have gotten through the EIR process to run the rail up the median strip of I15 for most of the planned route. That is commendable. They also have hired a design firm and have a contract with Siemens to build the rail cars. Not surprisingly, they have the support of organized labor so all work on the rail system will be union. Neither here nor there, but I would suggest that is partly how they were able to get through their EIR process so seamlessly.

At any rate, this rail project makes far more sense than the HSR that I have written about before that was planned from the SF Bay Area to Los Angeles. That one is far more expensive to build, and it is being built 100% with taxpayer dollars. At least this HSR from Rancho Cucamonga (where the hell is that anyway!!??) to Las Vegas only has \$3 billion (so far) in public money.

I wish this project well despite my cynical comments. Do I think it gets built?

Cynicism=Nope.

Hope = But I hope it does.







### **Workplace Violence Program**

Implementation "Target Date" - July 1, 2024

Senate Bill 553 requires employers to create, implement and maintain a Workplace Violence Program by July 1, 2024. Employers must also train their entire workforce.

The Workplace Violence Program must include a reporting mechanism (how is the employee going to report incidents), detailing who will be responsible for receiving complaints, and who will be responsible for identifying and mitigating workplace hazards.

Jim Persons has developed a Workplace Violence Program and Active Shooter Guidelines that meet the requirements of this new regulation. He can also provide training resources for your employees.

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### CALIFORNIA'S NEW WORKPLACE VIOLENCE PREVENTION REQUIREMENTS

No later than July 1, 2024, covered California employers must implement extensive workplace violence prevention plans (WVPP) and deliver specified training to employees under new legislation signed by Governor Gavin Newsom on September 30, 2023. In order to comply on time – including preparing plans that are "specific to the hazards and corrective measures <u>for each work area</u>" as required – employers will need to prepare early.

Senate Bill 533 adds section 6401.9 to the California Labor Code. The legislation is intended to help employers prevent and respond effectively to workplace violence.

Covered employers must deliver the training to all employees no later than July 1, 2024, and annually thereafter.

1. County of Sonoma PLA Negotiations Are at an Impasse Regarding Local Trucking-on May 21, 2024, the Board of Supervisors will have a public hearing on whether to include local trucking under their new PLA policy. As many of you know, if you want to write a letter to the Supes, or better yet, show up on May 21, your voice can be heard regarding this potential huge impact on our local workforce. For those that are doing their best to do their homework, there is no document draft available to review ahead of time. You have to rely on my "word of mouth" information that I have sounded off on.

As a refresher, BART, CALTRAIN, and other public transit systems are around \$9 billion short of breaking even due to increased costs, the pandemic rewriting office worker habits, and other factors. In order to solve this fiscal emergency, a Senate Bill 1031 (Senators Wiener & Wahab Launch The Connect Bay Area Act: Authorizing Transit Funding on the 2026 Ballot, Studying Consolidation, and Improving Regional Integration | Senator Scott Wiener (ca.gov)) has been developed and is probably going to make it to the ballot in November, 2024. This would, if passed, be more taxation to fund public transit systems and it would affect a lot of folks in and around the Bay Area. I am following it and will report on it in an upcoming Soapbox soon!!
