Just Give Us the Real Stuff

When Gov. Gavin Newsom and legislative leaders were drafting a more-or-less final 2025-26 state budget last month, they were closing what they described as a \$12 billion deficit, a number that the state's media repeatedly cited.

It was the wrong number; it minimizes the state's chronic gap between income and outgo, as the state's <u>official budget summary</u> released this week confirms.

The budget projects that the state will receive \$208.6 billion in general fund revenues during the fiscal year that began on July 1, but it will spend \$228.4 billion, a gap just shy of \$20 billion.

The \$12 billion figure stems from counting a \$7.1 billion diversion from one of the state's reserve accounts as revenue — an assumption that violates common sense as well as any legitimate accounting scenario. It is not true, not accurate, and seems intended to cover up for spending programs that cannot be sustained.

Would it bother you that California runs an entitlement program of expenditures that spends \$10 to \$20 billion more than it receives each year FOREVER!!!???

The more accurate figure of \$20 billion is important because it squares with projections by Newsom's Department of Finance and the Legislative Analyst's Office that California has what's called a <u>"structural deficit"</u> in the range of \$10 billion to \$20 billion a year.

In other words, financing all of the programs and services now in state law will indefinitely cost that much more each year than the state is likely to receive in revenues.

Why can't we be told the truth?

Remember when Newsom announced, as Senator Mike McGuire did, that California had a \$97 billion surplus so we could spend more money?

The surplus was a mirage, based on assumptions of a \$40 billion annual increase in revenues that never happened and that Newsom and McGuire and others in the Legislature knew would not happen. Last year, the Department of Finance acknowledged that revenues over four years would <u>fall short of expectations by</u> \$165 billion.

However, much of the phantom money was already spent, thereby creating the structural deficit that Newsom and Legislature basically ignored in putting together the current budget.

Budget cuts were discussed and modified recently in legislation action as the Governor's budget was adopted in June 2025. Public transit agencies and the University of California and California State University also avoid funding cuts under this spending plan, though some of the money for the university systems is deferred and they will be required to take out zero-interest loans from the state's general fund in the meantime. The deal includes \$45 million to help the struggling Sonoma State University, in Senate President Pro Tem Mike McGuire's district, to turn around its financial woes.

It is high time we demand better and more honest "news" as to how bad things are in CA. Silently hoping the state economy will magically turn around and start feeding over \$20 billion in income per year, it is not only dangerous, but also borderline fraudulent.

I do not pretend to have the answers, because political survival is the doctrine that all elected officials have to deal with, but wouldn't it be refreshing to have our paid legislators tell us the truth?

Just give us the real stuff. We can handle it. The truth can set you free!

Workplace Violence Program

Implemented - July 1, 2024

Senate Bill 553 requires employers to create, implement and maintain a Workplace Violence Program by July 1, 2024. Employers must also train their entire workforce.

The Workplace Violence Program must include a reporting mechanism (how is the employee going to report incidents), detailing who will be responsible for receiving complaints, and who will be responsible for identifying and mitigating workplace hazards.

Jim Persons has developed a Workplace Violence Program and Active Shooter Guidelines that meet the requirements of this new regulation. He can also provide training resources for your employees.
















NORTH BAY CONSTRUCTION CORPS

The North Bay Construction Corps (NBCC) is an after-school, 3-month basic construction training program for seniors in their last semester of high school. Classes are taught by local contractors and construction managers. Participants are introduced to a variety of trades and earn certifications in Personal Protective Equipment and CPR/First Aid.

Each meeting is led by a contractor or tradesperson who presents information about his/her particular trade and then leads students through a hands-on skill-building activity. There is a strong focus on safety awareness at each meeting.
